Tahereh Nadarajah has worked extensively overseas, including Papua New Guinea, Iran, Mongolia, Cambodia, Kosovo and East Timor. Her fields of expertise are in NGO strengthening, community development and environmental education and sustainable development. She prepared and taught a course on 'NGO Management'. Currently living in Damascus, she has recently completed a study of NGOs in Syria and will report on her findings in this Seminar.

The study was commissioned by the UNICEF Syria office and the Ministry of Social Affairs and Labor. The object of the study was to identify NGOs with the capacity and vision to become leaders and supporters of smaller/newer/more traditional NGOs and to identify the good practices and innovative approaches of these NGOs in addressing child protection, particularly in alternative care and prevention of abuse. This research has shown that there is a "New Breed of NGO" working in the field of child protection, leading the way for others to follow.
